Students will write at least four short formative papers in which they confront source material on their own, before class discussion. Such papers give students the opportunity to make their own conclusions about the subject matter and to practice writing and the construction of arguments. Two longer summative paper, dealing with more substantial issues, will be due in the final quarter. Finally, some short identification quizzes will assess student note-taking and command of course detail.
